Inspiration

Situation: The Earl of Salisbury, John of Gaunt's grandson in the Beaufort line and a first class English hero, greets John Talbot who has just escaped from French detention, and who at Orleans has rejoined the English forces.

SALISBURY: Talbot, my life, my joy, again returned! How wert thou handled being prisoner?
