## Disillusionment

Suffolk lets her know he'll help her meet her ambitions.

## Queen to Suffolk, No. 1

Am I, Lord Suffolk, a queen in title,
Subject to a duke? Is Great Britain's isle
Governed thus? Shall the king be a pupil
Under the surly Gloucester? I tell thee,
Pole, when in the city of Tours, thou stole
The French ladies' hearts. I thought King Henry
