FLORIZELL: I not intend to offer. I think Camillo?

Camillo removes his disguise.

FLORIZELL: Look up. From my succession wipe me, father. I am heir to my affection.

CAMILLO: Be advised.

FLORIZELL: I have reason. If not, my senses, better pleased with madness, do bid it welcome.
